#### Melody Zhao

Melody is 13 years old and started playing the piano when she was 6 years old. She is in her third year at Chetham's School of Music where she is a pupil of Mr. Simon Bottomley. Melody has won prizes in several local music festivals and was a finalist in the EPTA piano competition in Belgium.

#### Kairui Guo

Kairui was born in China and moved to the UK in 2017. He began learning piano at six with his mother and joined Chetham's in 2022. He studied with Mrs. Taylor for two years and now learns with Mr. Bottomley. At 16, he continues to grow as a pianist with focus and curiosity.

#### Julie Zhang

Born in 2008, Julie Zhang started learning piano at the age of 5. At age 6, she achieved ABRSM Grade 5 with distinction. In 2016, she entered Chetham's School of Music, studying piano under Mr. Simon Bottomley. In 2018, Julie achieved Distinction for the ATCL Diploma. Just one year later in 2019, she achieved a High Distinction for the LTCL diploma, also the Second Prize in Category 2 for the EPTA International Piano Competition. And finally, she achieved the FTCL Diploma. Julie has also won many online competitions. Her repertoire stretches from Baroque to Modern music. Julie particularly enjoys the Romantic Period, especially the sheer beauty of Chopin. Julie also enjoys chamber music and piano concertos.

## **Biographies**

Soprano, Laurie Ashworth was born in Wigan, Lancashire and she has established herself as highly sought-after concert artist, specialising in oratorio, recital and recording, which she combines with a busy teaching career.

Laurie commenced her studies at the Royal Northern College of Music under the tutelage of Caroline Crawshaw. She graduated with first class honors and was awarded the RNCM Gold Medal, the college's highest accolade for performance. Awards from The Arts and Humanities Research Council and The Countess of Munster Musical Trust enabled Laurie to complete her Masters in Vocal Performance at the Royal College of Music, where she studied with Patricia Rozario and Janis Kelly, graduating with distinction.

In 2010 following an acclaimed performance of Jonathan Dove's song Full Fathom Five, Laurie was awarded the Song Prize at the Kathleen Ferrier Awards. In the same year she was a finalist and runner-up in BBC Radio 2's The Kiri Prize; a nationwide search by Dame Kiri Te Kanawa and the BBC to find a new operatic star.

Laurie has performed at all of the UK's major venues, making her Wigmore Hall recital debut in 2014 and her BBC Proms debut at the Royal Albert Hall in 2012. She has appeared regularly in broadcasts for BBC Radio 2 and 3, and Songs of Praise, and she features as the soprano soloist on the premiere recordings of Bob Chilcott's Requiem (Hyperion Records) and St John Passion (Signum Records). Aside from performing, Laurie is regularly on the judging panel for the BBC Young Chorister of the year Competition.

Keen to expand her horizons, Laurie co-founded the vocal duo Eterni Amici with saxophonist Spencer Moran. The duo performed regularly on Viking Ocean Cruise Line, Holland America Line, Norwegian Cruise Line and Fred Olsen Cruise Line pre-pandemic, but Laurie is returning to the ships for short contracts in 2025!

**John Gough** was born and bred in Chester. He enjoys a busy career combining solo playing, accompaniment and teaching at the RNCM. He has broadcast many times on BBC Radio 3 and has performed at the Wigmore Hall, London, and as soloist with the RLPO and Northern Chamber Orchestras. Overseas, he has performed at the Carnegie Hall, New York, and on Danish Radio.

#### Biographies.

Wenchun Fan is a performer-researcher currently completing a PhD at the University of Leeds, supervised by Dr Clive McClelland and Professor Michael Allis. Originally from China, she began learning the violin at the age of five. In 2013, she entered the Central Conservatory of Music in Beijing, studying with Jia Zhang, Liwei Tan, and Wei Xue. She has performed at prestigious events including the Beijing Youth Art Festival, the International Youth Art Festival, and the 33rd Harbin Summer Music Festival, where she collaborated with world-renowned conductor Zubin Mehta, the Israel Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Harbin Symphony Orchestra. In 2017, Wenchun was awarded a full entrance scholarship and the George Henry Peters Scholarship to study at the Royal Northern College of Music under the distinguished violinist Leland Chen. Her studies were further supported by the China Scholarship Council's Special Art Talent Cultivation scheme.

As a soloist and chamber musician, she has performed widely across China and the UK. With the Ink Quartet, she won second prize at the 14th Luigi Cerritelli International Music Competition. Her practice-led research on Schubert has been presented at conferences including the BFE/RMA Research Students' Conference (Newcastle), the SMI/ICTMD-IE Conference (Maynooth), and the ÖAW Schubert Workshop (Vienna). She has also given recitals for the Schubert Institute UK at Conway Hall, London and in Leeds, and performs regularly in WACIDOM's concert series in Warrington.

Jordi Bitlloch was born in France in a musical family, Jordi attended the Yehudi Menuhin School in Surrey as a teenager, studying under Ruth Nye, and later the University of Arts in Berlin (Germany) under Pascal Devoyon, where he earned undergraduate and postgraduate degrees in performance. During those years he also attended courses and masterclasses with Ferenc Rados, Klaus Hellwig, Heime Müller (chamber music), Dietrich Fiescher-Dieskau and Eric Schneider (vocal accompaniment). His international breakthrough came when he won second prize and audience prize at the International Beethoven

Competition in Bonn (Germany). He has also garnered prizes in the European Piano Competition Vlado Perlemuter and Concours Aujourd'hui Musiques (France). He has performed throughout Europe as a soloist and chamber musician and has been a guest at festivals such as the Klavierfestival Ruhr (Germany), Music in Paxton (Scotland), Windsor Festival, Festival Jeunes Talents (France) and Euriade Festival (Holland). He is currently based in Manchester working as a performer and accompanist in the North West, and was Junior Fellow in Accompaniment at the Royal Northern College of Music between 2021 and 2023.

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Leon McCawley

Chris Hardy is a vibrant clarinetist with a love for performing solo, chamber and orchestral repertoire. He graduated with a first class honours degree from the Royal Northern College of Music in 2022, and a masters with distinction from the same institution in 2024. He performs as an extra player with professional orchestras across the UK including the Royal Philharmonic, BBC Philharmonic, Hallé, Royal Northern Sinfonia, and The Royal Liverpool Philharmonic. He is an experienced pit musician, having performed alongside members of Opera North and in musical productions across the UK. Also an avid chamber musician, Chris enjoys playing a range of classical and contemporary repertoire with numerous chamber

ensembles, one of which recently won the Royal Philharmonic Society's Henderson Prize in 2022 and have just released their debut album, recorded at the Stoller Hall. As a soloist, Chris is a regular recitalist, performing worldwide onboard cruise voyages, and recently performed Mozart's Clarinet Concerto with the Hallé Orchestra at the Bridgewater Hall.

Pianist **Hector Leung** graduated at the Royal Northern College of Music and obtained his Masters in Music (majoring solo piano performance) and FRSM Diploma with distinctions. His



main piano tutors were Dina Parakhina and Colin Stone. Having won best accompanist prizes for two song cycle competitions in 2015, both during the first term of his MMus studies, Hector was then nominated one of the RNCM Songsters pianists, and collaborated closely with the School of Vocal Studies and Opera.

Hector embarked on a much more intensive and fruitful chamber music journey from 2019 to 2021. He was awarded, for two years, to undertake a piano accompanist role as a Junior Fellow, and worked exclusively with rising young musicians and their distinguished faculty tutors on a day-to-day basis.

In 2017, Hector was featured in the RNCM annual commissioned composer series at London Wigmore Hall where he joined with oboist George Strickland to perform 'Forgotten Games 2' by British composer Tansy Davies. Around that time, he also played quite substantial piano parts for numerous RNCM concerts: highlights include "Contraflow (1992)" by Sir Colin Matthews; Symphony No.5 by Sergei Prokofiev; and West Side Story (fully-staged original, with RNCM Young Company) by Leonard Bernstein.

Currently sitting Principal Keyboard at the Manchester Northern Film Orchestra, Hector premiered and recorded the solo piano edition of the choral piece 'I Walked into the Darkness and Emerged from the Light' by American film music composer Shaun Drew.

Amongst Hector's very early achievements are his winning first prize at the Hong Kong International Pianist Association piano competition (HKIPA) in 2013 and a number of youth piano competitions within the same period.

Hector is on a new mission to create his own compositions to further his studies and to extend his concert repertoire.

The **Kell Wind Trio** has gained a reputation for giving lively and informative concerts which include music of many different styles and genres – from music of the Baroque to accessible music from the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> centuries.

The Kell Wind Trio is named after the pioneering English instrumentalist Reginald Kell, who was the first clarinettist to use vibrato in orchestral concerts.

**Alastair Roberts** plays principal flute with a number of orchestras in the Manchester area including the Wilmslow Symphony Orchestra and the Cheshire Sinfonia. He is a member of several chamber groups that perform regularly throughout the North West of England including the Telemann Baroque Ensemble.

**Geoffrey Smith** was a member of The National Youth Orchestra for five courses. He was Principal Clarinet with Stockport Symphony Orchestra for 46 years, Wilmslow Symphony Orchestra (22 years) and Cheshire Sinfonia (18 years). He has appeared many times as soloist with these and other orchestras. He is now concentrating on playing chamber music.

**Ian Harvey** was a Junior Exhibitioner at London's Royal Academy of Music. His musical commitments include the position of principal bassoon with the Stockport Symphony Orchestra. He runs his own business repairing woodwind instruments.

# **Biographies**

Laurence Hughes was a chorister at Hexham Abbey before studying cello with Hannah Roberts at Chetham's School of Music where he won a scholarship to the RNCM. After further studies in London, Laurence has enjoyed a career where he has sought to balance his professional academic interests with a love of making music. He is currently a member of the Sterling Trio as well as teaching the cello and freelancing with various orchestras. Laurence also directs the Ignatius Singers at the church of the Holy Name at Manchester University and is an associate member of the Manchester Chamber Choir.

Tom Henderson is from Cornwall and has established a reputation as a distinguished accompanist across the country. He studied piano with Melvyn Cooper at Warwick University. After graduating, Tom decided to pursue a career in tax and he currently works for the Low Incomes Tax Reform Group. Tom is also an accomplished choral singer. He currently sings with the Royal Philharmonic award nominated, Sunday Boys, an LGBTQ+ low-voiced choir based in Manchester, and



also performs with Manchester Chamber Choir and the Ignatius Singers. Tom was recently accompanist at the Stoller Hall in the world premiere of Michael Betteridge's new secular oratorio celebrating platonic friendships between straight women and LGBTQ+ men, 'Stay as long as you like' as well as playing on the group's successful tour of Italy last summer.

## **Background and Biographies**

The Talland Quartet, based in Manchester, is dedicated to sharing it's passion for chamber music. Formed at the Royal Northern College of Music, the quartet received the Hirsch, Weil, and Brodsky Prizes. The Quartet were selected to perform at the RNCM's Original Voices Festival and worked with composer Eden Longson to premiere a new piece at the Enys Chamber Music Festival in August 2023.

**Dylan Edge**, raised in Staffordshire, started the violin aged 9 through Staffordshire Performing Arts. He went on to study under the tutelage of Catherine Yates at the Junior Department of the Royal Northern College of Music. He furthered his studies at the RNCM, graduating with a First-Class Honours degree and a Masters with Distinction under the mentorship of Cecily Ward. Whilst completing his masters studies, Dylan successfully trialled for the Hallé and became a member of the first violin section. As an orchestral musician, Dylan regularly freelances with the BBC Philharmonic, Royal Liverpool Philharmonic and Manchester Camerata. He also plays with Manchester Collective and enjoyed joining them on their Weather and Fever Dreams Tours. Dylan plays on a 1778 George Gemünder Violin.

**Orla McGarrity** is an Irish violinist based in Manchester where she graduated from the RNCM with a First-Class Honours Degree, studying with James Clark. She is currently pursuing a Masters under the tutelage of Cecily Ward and Pavel Fisher also at the RNCM, and has performed in masterclasses for Arabella Steinbacher, Nathaniel Vallois and Vera Vaidman. Recent highlights include performing works inspired by climate change at the Wigmore Hall with the RNCM Sinfonietta and playing with Northern Ireland Opera in their Autumn production of Eugene Onegin.

In 24/25 Orla is one of the Hard Rain Soloist Ensemble's Young Artists, receiving coaching on and performing contemporary repertoire. Orla's love for curating chamber events, led her to working as the Programming Assistant at the RNCM in 2022/23 and co-directing Enys Chamber Music Festival in Cornwall. She also enjoyed interning at Weesp Chamber Music Festival in the Netherlands. Orla recently set up the Mourne Chamber Music Festival in Newcastle County Down which she plans to continue for years to come. She plays on a 1920 Carlo Carletti violin generously loaned to her by the Harrison Frank Family Foundation and is grateful to be supported by the William and Frances Dobie Charitable Foundation.

**Rebecca Stubbs** is a violist from West Yorkshire. She completed her Master's degree at the Royal Northern College of Music, where she studied with Vicci Wardman, Alex Mitchell and Susie Mészáros. Here she was awarded the RNCM Viola Prize and in 2022 became the Junior Fellow in Viola.

Rebecca regularly freelances with the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic, Manchester Camerata and the BBC Philharmonic. She teaches upper strings and is a workshop coordinator at the North of England Centre for Music and Arts. Rebecca plays on a Niccolò viola by Chris Tayler.

**Nathan Jackson** is currently studying for a masters in cello performance with Jen Langridge and Eddie Pogossian at the RNCM, where he graduated recently with a First-Class Honours degree. He has completed the BBC Philharmonic Professional Experience Scheme and the Hallé's String Leadership Scheme, leading to regular work within both orchestras. With a keen interest in chamber music, Nathan has been fortunate to perform in the Hallé's annual chamber music series alongside members of the cello section.

Nathan is also a keen performer of baroque music, which he enjoys studying with Jonathan Manson and Roger Hamilton on a period instrument. He currently plays a Robin Aitchson Cello generously loaned to him by the RNCM.
